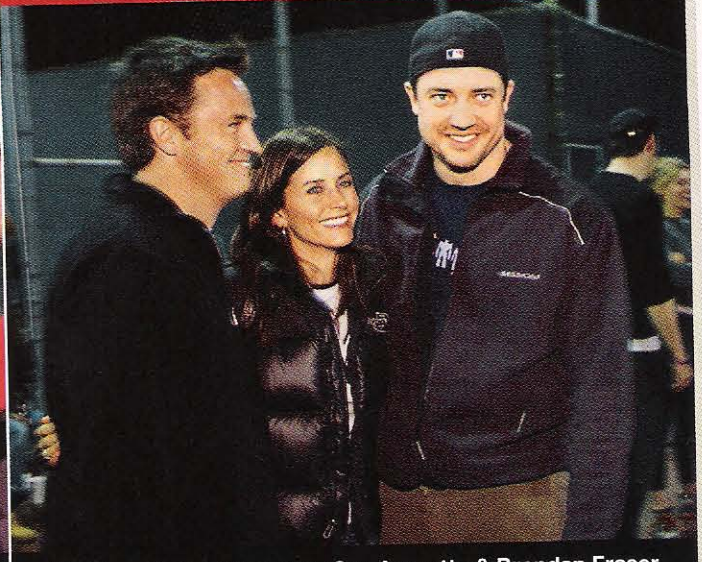


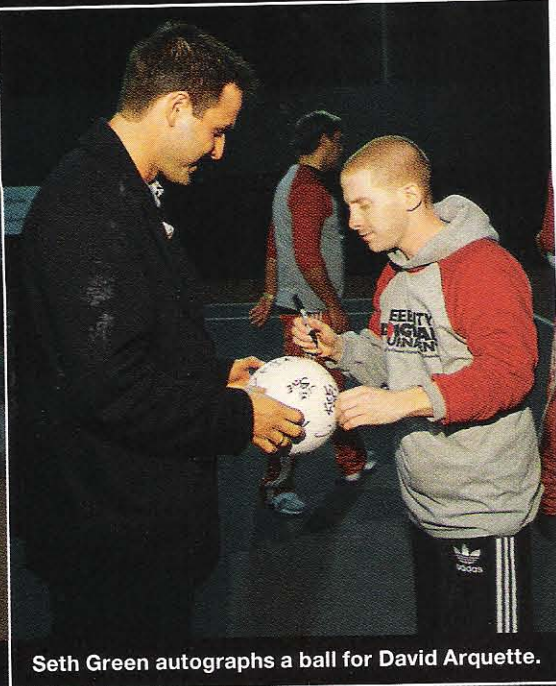
Survivor's Ethan Zohn (left) was one of the last men standing.

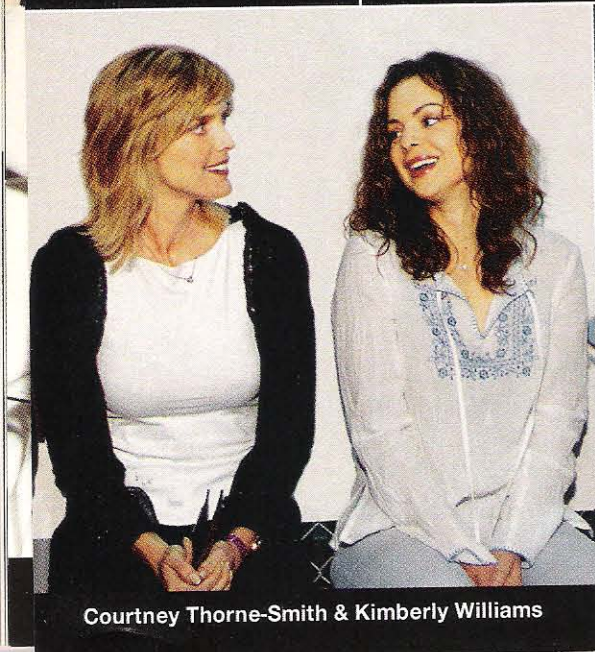


Seth Green autographs a ball for David Arquette.
